When you give human characteristics to things, abstract ideas etc. *The dancing daffodils*.



A particular way of thinking about something. The teacher and the pupil had different perspectives on the need for school uniform.

Emotions

A feeling such as happiness, love, anger, hatred etc., caused by the situation you are in.

Pathetic fallacy is when you give inanimate objects in nature human feelings. This is often used for weather, such as the gloomy clouds covered up the sun.

Writers use it to help develop mood or atmosphere of a situation.
