
## The Queen's Platinum Jubilee


#### TSArTs Week

Both New Horizons Children's Academy and The Victory Academy have been working together this academic year to produce a show that celebrates a range of dance styles and cultures from all around the world. On Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> June we celebrated this by performing a diverse selection of dances at The Victory Academy to over 150 family, friends and teachers.

The project has been a fantastic opportunity for all involved. A group of our students have been responsible for exploring each dance style to teach to Years 3 and 4. They visited New Horizons in March and taught workshops and choreography. This allowed our students to gain some valuable teaching experience and also gave them the chance to work with younger students. After the workshops, the New Horizons students and their teachers went away and continued to develop these dances and explore their style of dance in more depth. They also spent time during their lessons looking into the different cultures and history



behind the dance styles from around the world. A few weeks before the performance, New Horizons filmed their progress with their dances for the Victory students to watch and give feedback. They decided on what feedback to give to help New Horizons students develop and improve their dances even more.

The Around the World show was a great success. Years 3 and 4 performed Samba, Jazz, Bollywood, Irish, African and Street dance styles amazingly. Our Victory students also decided to come together to create a performance as part of the celebration. # What are CoRT tools?


CoRT (Cognitive Research Trust) is the name given to a programme of 60 'thinking tools' designed by Dr Edward de Bono.

CoRT was designed to explore the direct teaching of thinking as a skill in schools.

Originally formulated for teachers of English, the programme is now used throughout the education sector, across subjects.

#### **Benefits of The CoRT tools:**

- People can learn to think and judge for themselves
- Develop a greater understanding and appreciation of your own potential
- ✓ Become more proactive and constructive
- Provides for broader thinking and a more comprehensive viewpoint or
- ✓ decision



#### How you can use Victory Virtues with your child at home:

#### First Important Priorities

You use this tool to prioritise ideas, concepts and actions.

Ask your child to consider their First Important Priorities in order to identify their areas for development.

Consider what strategies they might use in order to improve the areas identified.



#### FIP – First Important Priorities:

First Important Priorities is a problem solving activity that guides students to see connections among researched facts, independent thinking, and pertinent action. By practicing the strategy, students learn to examine their own ideas, discuss and challenge other's ideas, question how final decisions are made, and see how the process of decision-making impacts outcomes.

The Year 9 team also made the quarterfinals of the Cup Competition, but lost to Rainham Mark. Special mentions to some Year 9 standout performers; Junior A, Abdul B, Abdaelay D, Dennis Z and Samuel E who scored four goals in the final game.

The Year 10 team went one better by reaching the semi-finals of their Cup Competition, but unfortunately lost to a very strong Howard School team. Well done to all the players involved in a really successful season.

#### APD Football Academy

The Sixth Form students finished 8<sup>th</sup> in the Kent Schools Academies League North Division, out of 14 teams, and finished the season really well. As a team they have made huge improvements from the start of the season and will look to build on this impressive form next season.

Doing Fame was an excellent experience and developed friendships throughout the cast, and I would definitely recommend being in the school's performances."

Karolina K – "Being in the show was an amazing experience that taught me cooperation and patience. I was cast as a lead role in the show and that really showed me how with practice better opportunities open up to you. At the beginning of Fame Jr, I was only supposed to do a couple of nights but I was told I was going to be doing all the nights, and I felt really excited but nervous at the same time. I was really excited because this showed me that if I worked hard all of it would pay off in the future and it did. Having a duet in the show with another lead role showed what I was capable of and how much I believed in myself to do good."


#### Geography Stars

This high standard we saw on the fieldtrip was expected as students across our GCSE classes have stretched themselves throughout this academic year. Particular students include Callum B, Gabriela D, Diogo B, Willow C, Christine G, Kika B, Louisa H and Karolina K, who have all displayed consistent success in Geography this year. They have sought opportunities to work beyond the GCSE specification, engaging in fascinating geographical debates where they have begun to effectively speak like a geographer, and shown enthusiasm to develop and improve when faced with difficulty. We want this to continue as a GCSE cohort into Year 11!

Two Year 8 students went above and beyond earlier this year when they participated in the 'This

Is Geography' national competition run by the Christ Church College, as part of Oxford University. As part of this competition, Chineye O and Ayoka B produced a presentation about a geographical issue that relates to them personally using a range of geographical software and tools. This was a fantastic opportunity for real geographic application and the department were incredibly proud of their endeavours.

We are proud of the efforts of our KS3 students who have persevered throughout this challenging academic year. The students have been stretched, engaging with demanding and contemporary issues which will dictate their lives beyond the classroom into the future. For example, our Year 9 have explored the geopolitics of climate change, questioning who is responsible and the challenges facing our leaders who could formulate solutions. In



addition, their work this term on boarders has sparked fierce debate, informed by Tim Marshall and his book 'Prisoners of Geography'. Even our Year 7 have had opportunities to question their own misconceptions of our planet using 'Factfulness' by Hans Rosling.

Over the summer we will be working for ways to increase the use of state-of-the-art technology and software to enhance the student experience, and provide opportunities for students to discuss the pressing issues facing our world today.

# Science

#### Poster Competition

## Virtual STEM Challenge

On 11<sup>th</sup> July Year 7 took part in a virtual STEM Challenge and Careers Day provided by PPMA Best, a consortium of engineering companies, through STEM Learning. During the day students listened to talks from professionals working as engineers and took part in two activities. The first was to build an Eco Factory Roller Loader using only the items provided and within the time scale.



The idea was to move items along the loader slowly. Each Roller Loader was tested with a marble and the slowest verified time without the

marble stopping was recorded. The second challenge was to think of a new invention or piece of technology, draw a design of the idea, then work on a pitch to be delivered in 40 seconds. Each tutor group chose their best pitch and then Mrs Crane-Herbert and Miss Simperl decided on the overall winner. All those who took part received an engineering ruler. The winners of the trophies are: The Best Eco Factory Roller Loader was group 7.7 with a time of 22.5 seconds

The Best Pitch was group 7.5 with their invention of



a robot turtle that roamed the oceans picking up and recycling plastic waste. Congratulations to both tutor groups and well done to all those who took part.

#### Sustainable Futures Challenge

Year 7 students Alex K, Tayler C, Joel T, and Maxymilian M earned STEM Without Borders certificates for entering the Sustainable Futures: Innovation Challenge. The certificate is awarded by the Royal Academy of Engineering for taking part in the challenge. The students came up with a creative solution to tackle some of the biggest challenges that are impacting our environment and creating carbon emissions. To earn a certificate the students had to design and engineer a technology that works towards a sustainable future. The ideas were presented in a project portfolio, demonstrating engineering habits of mind. The students showed a good understanding of the problem tackled and why it was important. They showed how their solution tackled the problems identified and them communicated that idea in clear and creative ways.

The problem our students looked at was the carbon emissions from industry (a manufacturing plant). Their idea was to build a self-contained ecosystem on the roof of the manufacturing plant which uses the emissions from the factory to grow food. They thought about how to keep food production at a maximum all year, how waste could be recycled and how to make sure the ecosystem maintained a healthy temperature, light and nutrition balance.

Our Science Technician Mrs Wade has earned accreditation by STEM learning, University of York as an Associate STEM Learning Facilitator. Mrs Wade can now deliver quality CPD to STEM colleagues. Since accreditation she has presented CPD sessions at the South East Technicians Conference at Discovery Park, Sandwich and at the Association of Science Education Southern Technicians Conference at the University of Surrey.

# Science (cont)

#### Canterbury Christchurch Trip

On Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> June a group of twelve Year 10 students were invited to Canterbury Christchurch University to take part in a day of practical work in their new £64m facilities for Science and Engineering. Our students undertook some forensic work on a mock crime scene where they prepared DNA samples from the scene and suspects, and then ran a gel electrophoresis to produce a DNA 'fingerprint'. The University also provided a workshop on fingerprints and fingermarks. Students learnt how forensic scientists identify the different characteristics of ridge patterns as well as 'lifting' fingermarks from paper. Students were even allowed to take their own fingerprints and make them into a keyring.

Staff at the University were impressed by how quickly our students mastered the lab skills and all participants enjoyed themselves, even Mr Power and Mr Carr got stuck in! Here are some quotes from staff at CCCU. "Both Rodrigo and I were impressed by your students in the lab." "...Students did a good job of prepping and loading the gels, as can be seen from the well-defined brand shapes – loading the wells is tricky and they did pretty well for a first attempt." The Year 10 represented The Victory Academy extremely well and should be proud of their achievements.



## A Level Biology Fieldtrip

The Year 12 Biology trip to FSC Juniper Hall, Surrey went really well this year. Students conducted ecology experiments including the mark, release and recapture of pond snails, setting animal traps, and investigating the effects of different abiotic factors on an ecosystem. Students were also taught important statistical tests as part of their A Level course in order to pass their practical endorsement certificate.





#### Creative Workshops

Our Art department have put on a variety of workshops this term. The University of the Creative Arts delivered a Utopian Cities architecture workshop for some of our Year 9 students. Then in June Canterbury Chirstchurch University did a Board Game Design workshop to Year 7 and 8. It was great seeing the students' different creations and having a go at playing some of them.



#### Art Exhibition

The Art team has been busy setting up a corridor maze to display Year 11 and 13 artwork. We hope our students and staff have enjoyed viewing the amazing work on show.



#### National Gallery Trip

In July our Art students from Years 10 and 12 visited the National Gallery. They had the opportunity to view numerous masterpieces and even took part in an art 'scavenger hunt' for their teachers' favourites.
