



Changing spaces, making places: A local place

You are going to make a profile of the local area- the school at the centre and a 1 mile radius around it are your limits.

You need to find out and present the following:-

- Demographic profile- numbers of, genders, ages, sex of, ethnicity.
- Socio economic data profile- unemployment, employment, occupations, educational qualifications, types of housing, housing tenure (ownership). Crime data.
- Cultural profile
- Built characteristics- land use, building survey,
- Political characteristics- number of councillors
- Natural characteristics- rivers, relief (height) of land, mountains, lakes, coastal/ inland, biome?
- Connections with other places historically and today- e.g. migration, colonialism, trading
- Changing flows of people and money

<u>Help</u>

- HINT: look at the census data, deprivation data, contact the local council....
- Find crime data at <u>www.police.uk-</u> type in the postcode and search for local crimes that have taken place
- Find socio economic data at different levels from the office for national statistics (ONS)
- www.neighbourhoodstatistics.gov.uk
- Much data comes from unreliable sources. You need to make sure the data you get is from as reliable a resource as possible so use UN data or the office for national statistic.
- Be aware of bias that may exist on certain pre- prepared data as often statistics are miss represented to make a point.
- When using newspapers to research storylines you must consider the view of the publication. Thus using multiple sources as evidence would be useful.
- You must source your data so that its validity can be checked.
