#### Student Drive Team

Our Student Drive Team has been busy making a display board to show house points and Thinking Tools. Students can see regular updates and the 'Thinking Tool of the Term'.



In May our Student Drive Team took part in a cultural exchange event with students from the Czech Republic. They described the Thinking Tools and gave a few examples of the Keys, CORT Tools and Maps and their use in a variety of subjects.



The team also took part in a group activity to demonstrate how Thinking Hats are used. For each hat we asked our students to explain what the hat was used for, for example when discussing the red hat students gave their personal responses to the activity. For the yellow hat they explained what they gained from talking to someone new – learning from each other, making new friends, gaining confidence and using languages. The third hat discussed was the black hat, and as the Czech students had been exposed to the previous examples, they answered first and our Victory students answered second. The final hat we looked at was the green hat, where the students came up with improvements for the activity such as name tags, more space, less furniture.

A big well done to our Student Drive Team for their enthusiasm and teamwork at this event!

The students arrived at The Victory Academy on the Saturday to take part in activities with our own students to better understand and experience British culture. First, all students had the chance to bake traditional scones to later eat during afternoon tea. While we waited for the scones to bake, the Czech students had the chance to sample a variety of British foods such as sausage rolls, a variety of sauces, Marmite, Dairy Milk chocolate and much more. There were definitely some very mixed opinions about the foods that were tasted but, overall, the Czech students learnt more about British



culture and cuisine. Soon after, the scones were ready, and the afternoon tea had been prepared. The students were taught how to traditionally eat their scones with jam and cream and were taught how to make tea. Lastly, the Czech students were introduced to finger sandwiches which are traditionally always eaten during afternoon tea. This day was all about teaching the students all about everyday foods and regular traditions of the British.

### RSC Final Performance

After months of cultivation, The Victory Academy's Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) project finally bloomed on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> June. Mr Best and Miss Davies took 11 students to Samphire Hoe, Dover, to perform in front of two live audiences, *Voyage of Their Lives.* We had the great pleasure to work with excerpts from one of Shakespeare's most morally complex plays, *The Merchant of Venice.* Throughout the project, the students engaged with the complexities of Shakespeare's text, the vast depth and wide breadth of emotion within the text, and tackled some very challenging themes.



One audience member said: "There's a special feeling about the RSC programme in Kent," and we at The Victory Academy couldn't agree more!

Mr Best is now looking forward to the next RSC project, *King Lear* at The Marlowe Theatre, and is excited to work with returning and new students on the project.



#### Geographers in the Field

It's been a busy and exciting time for Geography students across the school, with fieldwork taking centre stage this term as part of our commitment to hands-on, enquiry-led learning.

#### GCSE Fieldwork: Urban and Coastal Investigation

Our GCSE Geographers have undertaken two contrasting fieldtrips this term to deepen their understanding of both urban and coastal environments – key components of their fieldwork enquiry.

In Chatham town centre, students investigated the question 'How does environmental quality vary across Chatham, and what factors influence it?'



Students collected a range of data including environmental quality surveys, pedestrian counts and litter tallies across different locations. This urban fieldwork helped them explore the spatial variation of urban quality and the human and physical factors that influence it.

Later in the term, they headed to Herne Bay to study coastal processes, focusing on the impact of longshore drift and the effectiveness of groynes. Students conducted beach profiles, measured sediment size and shape, and observed signs of erosion and deposition. Both trips provided excellent opportunities for students to apply geographical skills, work collaboratively, and develop meaningful conclusions based on first-hand evidence.

#### A Level Stratford Trip: Regeneration in Action

Our Year 12 Geographers visited Stratford, East London, to examine how the area has been transformed through regeneration and place branding since the 2012 Olympics. They assessed changes in land use, environmental quality, and local perceptions – all vital for their *Changing Places* case study and future NEA coursework. Students were especially interested in the role of flagship developments like Westfield and the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in reshaping Stratford's identity.



#### KS3 Fieldwork Foundations

Across Key Stage 3, students have been introduced to the importance of geographical fieldwork and enquiry. Students have explored how geographers collect and present data, learning about sampling methods, primary and secondary data, and how to ask meaningful questions about the world around them. These early experiences lay a strong foundation for more advance investigations in the years to come.

Last term our Year 8 students were set a competition by the History department to design a creative piece to commemorate the lives and experiences of 'The Five' as working-class women in Victorian London.

Natural History Museum Trip

On 2<sup>nd</sup> July we took our year 10 students to London for an adventurous day at the Natural History Museum. There were many exhibitions to look around – it was safe to say a map was needed!

Students were given the opportunity to have small group 'behind the scenes' tours of the Spirit Collections, where they saw samples collected personally by Charles Darwin. They learnt that flesh eating beetles are used in the museum to study bones of organisms and got to see them through a live camera feed.

It was a packed day of activities and will help the year 10s in their GCSE curriculum next academic year.



### Science

#### AgriTech Xperience Trip

In July 11 of our year 9 students had the opportunity to visit Canterbury Christ Church University to take part in the AgriTech Xperience, looking at the future careers in farming and food.

Students undertook multiple practical activities throughout the day:

- The Secret Life Beneath Our Feet students learnt the importance of microorganisms and tree communication. They also used microscopes to truly see what is truly lurking in soil.
- Medway Food Innovation Centre students looked at how technology is used in the food industry and got to see an example of 3D printed food.
- A tour of the CCCU engineering department.
- Grow with the Glow of Seaweed students learnt how seaweed is an alternative to chemical fertilisers and how they can reduce the issues caused by fertiliser use. Students then made a formula using seaweed to add to their seeds.
- The Case of the Silent Patients in this session students learnt about how it is important that there are people looking at the health of plants, diagnosing any issues and then treating them.

The day was a great experience. Well done to the students for representing the school.

They also completely fell in love with the otter, so Mrs Thomas has adopted him and there will be a plaque at the otter enclosure for 12A Biology for the next year!
